LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)-Un beaten champion Cassius Clay places his heavyweight title on the line for the second time Monday night, this one against former two-time champion Floyd Patterson in a match billed for 15 rounds-or considerably less.

Interest may center not so much as to how long the fight lasts but to what extent the boxing fans around the world will

Indications are that the fans, a courageous lot, won't want to miss it.

The match goes on in the Las Vegas Convention Center, which incidentally is a showcase for even better things, at 10 p.m.,

It also will be shown for an international audience on a closed circuit theater-auditorium system in the United States and Canada and even disrupt the very late-late shows in England and Europe at 4 a.m., their time, if they are blessed with such late-late pleasures.

The early bird satellite will carry the bout abroad.




