

# Clay Puts Heavyweight Title on Line Against Patterson

## VIE MONDAY IN LAS VEGAS

Hope for Live Gate of \$300,000

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Unbeaten champion Cassius Clay places his heavyweight title on the line for the second time Monday night, this one against former two-time champion Floyd Patterson in a match billed for 15 rounds—or considerably less.

Interest may center not so much as to how long the fight lasts but to what extent the boxing fans around the world will accept it.

Indications are that the fans, a courageous lot, won't want to miss it.

The match goes on in the Las Vegas Convention Center, which incidentally is a showcase for even better things, at 10 p.m., EST.

It also will be shown for an international audience on a closed circuit theater-auditorium system in the United States and Canada and even disrupt the very late-late shows in England and Europe at 4 a.m., their time, if they are blessed with such late-late pleasures.

The early bird satellite will carry the bout abroad.

The promoters, Intercontinental Promotions Inc., and the local Silver State Boxing Club, hope for a live gate of \$300,000.

Total revenues, they say, may fall short of the record \$4.8 million for the first Clay-Sonny Liston thing in Miami, Fla., in 1964, which still isn't a bad record to fall short of.

## NEWMAN RIPS CARDS, 42 TO 7

Belle Chasse Gets Lone TD Late in Game

After a slow start, the Newman Greenies emptied the bench in chalking up a 42-7 victory over Belle Chasse Saturday afternoon at Behrman Stadium.

With John Autenreith leading the scoring parade with two touchdowns, Newman stopped the Cardinals cold until the final three minutes when they put a score on the board.

On the first set of plays in the game Newman drove for a score with Autenreith punching over from seven yards out. In the second period, Newman drove 53 yards with quarterback Hal Stibbs carrying the final eight yards.

Then in the second half Newman broke loose, scoring practically every time they got the ball. At the same time, Belle Chasse couldn't move the ball. In the third quarter the Cardinals got off only 12 plays.

Autenreith started the second half scoring by intercepting a pass and returning it 25 yards. This was followed later by a 67-yard drive with fullback Billy Green, who chalked up 49 of those yards, driving over the goal from the one-yard line.

The Greenies' final score came on a 51-yard burst up the middle by halfback Dick Egan. With three minutes left Belle Chasse marched 70 yards behind quarterback Billy Keller and the running of halfback Russell Richard. Keller scored from the one-yard line and ran for the extra point.

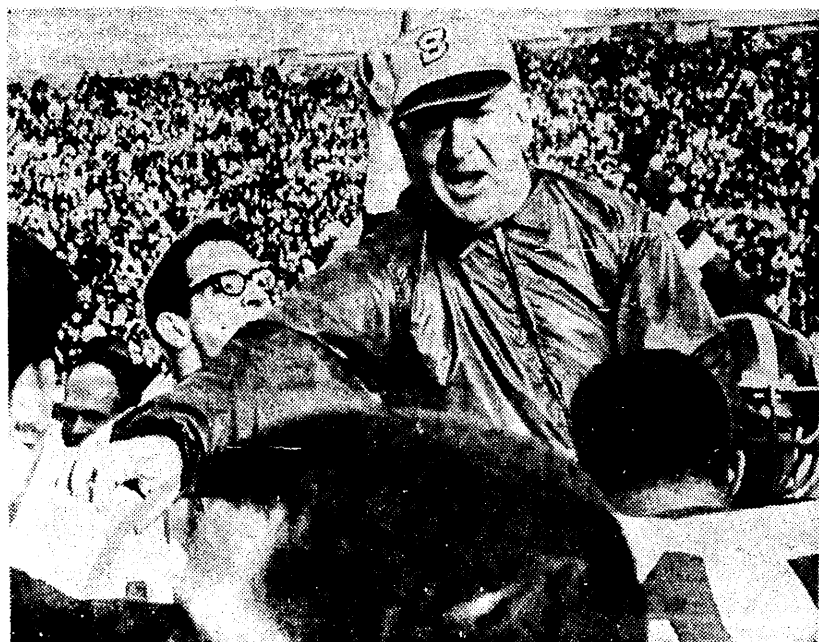
## Robinson Leads Landry, 33 to 6

GRAMBLING, La. — Grambling College rolled over Southern University, 34-14 Saturday in Tiger Stadium, to win the Southwestern Athletic Conference championship.

More than 18,000 filled the college stadium. Some spectators took seats on embankments in the end zones, while others saw the game from neighboring roof tops.

Coach Eddie Robinson's Tigers were in command throughout the first half. Grambling scored one touchdown in the first quarter and two in the second.

Grambling marched 65 yards on eight plays on the opening kickoff to score.

Coach Charley McClendon led the Tigers in a "Pig Sooooo" yell after announcing to the team that they had earned a bid to meet Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl.

"And tonight there's no curfew," McClendon screamed above the din in the LSU dressing room.

Across the field, the Tulane players dressed quietly. "It's a pretty lousy feeling to want a game so badly and then play like we did," said Bobby Duhan.

"We gave 'em too many opportunities early," said Coach Tommy O'Boyle. "And they got every point they could get. They had their big men in there right until the end."

"The reason I ordered us to run although we were so far behind was because I wanted to give my defensive unit a rest."

"But this is a young team. We have only about nine seniors. This will be a better football team next year."

"We'll play LSU again. Tonight wasn't our last shot. We'll be back."

## Wave Suffers Worst Half in History in Loss to LSU

BATON ROUGE, La. — Tulane's route out of the South-

eastern Conference Saturday night led through the valley of ineptitude and LSU couldn't have scored any easier or any oftener in the first half if it had been playing the Tulane Stadium ground crew.

It was, unquestionably, the worst first half in Tulane history, even worse than the Florida debacle last week for LSU, in piling up a 34 to 0 lead, accumulated the unbelievable total of 308 yards — 197 on the ground and 111 through the air.

For all the opposition the Greenies offered, they could have been cut out of green and grey tissue paper and the Tigers simply ran at will around Tulane's retreating ends, who more often than not looked as if they were joining the LSU interference.

Once again the Tulane's tackling was poor, the coverage of passes was inadequate and the Greenies were slow under kicks. Once again, the blocking was virtually non-existent and Tulane didn't make its initial first down rushing until the last minute of the half and didn't put two first downs together until the last play of the half.

The second half was not much better and Tulane did few things right and LSU did few things wrong as the score mounted to tie the all-time Tiger count of 62 to 0 in the fading seconds, Tulane stayed on the ground as if trying to run out the clock to prevent another LSU touchdown.

Thus Tulane ended its football affiliation with the SEC with its 17th defeat (with two ties) in the last 19 games with LSU and by the all time record-losing margin of 62 to 0, the same score by which LSU won in 1958 and 1961.

LSU was sharp and ready to play a fine game, and doubtless would have won even in the face of a good Tulane effort. But there were few individual good Tulane efforts in Tiger Stadium Saturday night, and cumulatively none at all.

The Tulane defense, when all the yards were added up, yielded 497 yards to the Tigers. And although the Greenie attack did total 180 yards for the night, it was strictly a Korean War offensive, that is to say, the Greenies didn't push beyond the 38th parallel on LSU's side of the field.

## Zora Folley Wants a Shot at Title

Hopes to Use Foster as Springboard

When Zora Folley steps into the Municipal Auditorium ring Dec. 6 to fight Bob Foster, his bout strategy will include a little more than just enough to beat the rangy heavyweight.

Zora is anxious to pour it on Foster in hopes of obtaining a possible match with the Monday night winner between Cassius Clay and Floyd Patterson.

"Ted Brenner (Madison Square Garden matchmaker) is ready to sign the Clay-Patterson winner to meet me next June," Folley informed matchmaker Lou Messina, "and you can bet all the tea in China that Foster or no one else will stop me from getting that opportunity."

Folley's victims include such topnotchers as Eddie Machen, Doug Jones, George Chuvalo, Robert Cleroux, Karl Mildener (European heavyweight champion), Henry Cooper (popular British Empire titleholder who floored Clay), Mike DeJohn and many others. Zora lost a disputed decision to the WBA champion Ernie Terrell.

In his last fight several months ago, Folley scored a shutout over Oscar Bonavena, the Italian heavyweight who recently whipped Greg Peralta before 8,000 fans. This is the same Peralta who won and lost to Willie Pastrano.

Folley is regarded by astute boxing fans as the uncrowned heavyweight champion. They figure he has the style to whip either Clay or Patterson.

Unable to get the better light-heavies to meet him, Foster is willing to meet any heavyweight in the world. With a few additional pounds, Bob feels he has the ability to outpoint the leading title contenders.

Efforts to get champion Jose Torres into the ring with him have been futile. The Washington, D. C., sharpshooter possesses one of the best left hands in the business and it is with this weapon he hopes to upset Folley.

## Murray Resigns After Victory

DURHAM, N.C. (AP)—Duke coach Bill Murray announced his resignation Saturday immediately after his team whipped North Carolina, 34-7 to wind up in a tie with South Carolina for the Atlantic Coast Conference title.

Murray, who completed his 15th year, stood at the door of the dressing room and shook hands of all his players. In the locker room they sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow."

The bout will be over the 10-round distance.

In his two fights here, Foster made a decided hit with the fans. He stopped Charley Leslie and then gave the rugged Henry Hank a lesson in the manly art over the 12-round distance. Foster's fight with Hank drew 7,805 customers who paid \$28,452—one of the best "gates" in years.

Because of the numerous reservations pouring in from various Louisiana, Mississippi and Alabama towns, Messina is pre-



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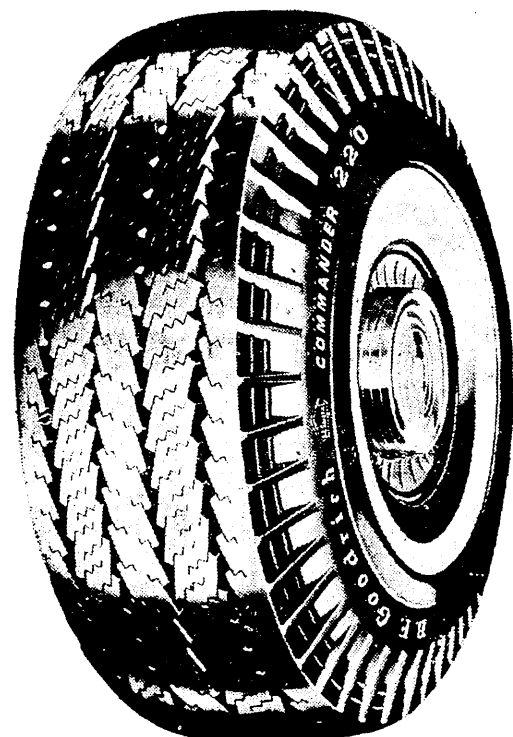
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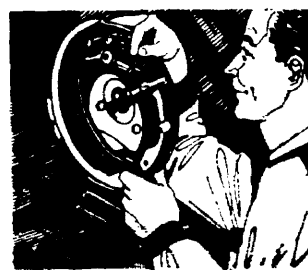
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
